Join us for a stunning musical collaboration as world-renowned harpist Emmanuel Ceysson joins forces with the exceptional Irish soprano Sarah Shine for an evening of music and song.

Described as "brilliantly gifted", Ceysson is one of the world's leading harpists, having held principal positions with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Metropolitan Opera and Opéra de Paris. A master of his instrument, he brings technical brilliance and a flair for the dramatic to every performance.

Joining him as a special guest is rising star of Irish opera Sarah Shine, whose radiant voice has captivated audiences across Europe. Quickly establishing herself as an artist of international acclaim, Sarah has performed with Irish National Opera, Académie Opéra National de Paris, Wexford Festival Opera and the RTÉ Concert Orchestra.

The programme will feature virtuosic and flamboyant instrumental performances of music by Tournier and Caplet and together the duo will perform exquisite songs by Vierne in addition to popular favourites by Debussy and Fauré.

Don't miss this rare opportunity to experience the artistry of a true master of the pedal harp alongside one of Ireland's most exciting young sopranos.

Emmanuel Ceysson

Harpist



With his powerful, virtuoso playing, Emmanuel Ceysson sweeps away all the clichés associated with his instrument. His infectious enthusiasm and boundless energy reveals the harp in all its sparkling splendour, in a world where poetry rhymes with temperament.

Chosen amongst 70 others of his best peers in a totally blind and anonymous audition process, he is since September 2020 the new Los Angeles Philharmonic Harpist under the baton of Gustavo Dudamel. This exciting symphonic position comes after almost 15 years playing opera in the pit, as Principal Harp: first with the Opéra National de Paris, a job he won aged 22, and then for 5 full seasons with the legendary New York MET Opera Orchestra.

Born and raised in France, he studied at the Paris Conservatoire under the tutelage of Isabelle Moretti, and then managed to collect the highest international distinctions and prizes in the course of 5 years: Gold Medallist at the 2004 USA international Harp Competition, First Prize at the New York Young Concert Artists Auditions in 2006, and First Prize at the 2009 ARD competition in Munich; thus securing a press acclaimed solo career, as recitalist in major concert venues like Carnegie Zankel Hall, Wigmore Hall, Salle Gaveau, Munich

Gasteig, Wiener Konzerthaus, Hyogo concert hall, and as soloist with orchestras such as the Oslo Philharmonic, Bavarian Radio Orchestra, Deutsche Symphonie Orchester, RAI Orchestra Torino, Orchestre National de Lyon, PKF Prague Philharmonia...

He also took part in important music festivals all over the planet including the Edinburgh International Festival, the Cartagena Music Festival, the Mecklenburg Vorpommern Festival, Hong Kong Premiere Performance, Caramoor and Classical Tahoe...

As a recording artist, his wide discography covers solo, chamber music and concerto harp repertoire with labels such as Naxos, BR klassik, Naïve, Aparte, Alpha Classics, and received praise from the specialized press.

He also invests lots of time teaching masterclasses worldwide, held Visiting Professor positions at the London Royal Academy of Music and Helsinki Sibelius Academy, and teaches a harp studio at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music.

Finally, he was recently appointed associate music director of the USA International Harp Competition, and works hand in hand with Linda Wood Rollo and Elizabeth Hainen-DePeters to help prepare the upcoming contests.

Sarah Shine

Soprano



Sarah Shine is a soprano from Limerick based in Turin, Italy. She was most recently heard in Irish National Operas nationwide tour of Die Fledermaus as "a gloriously soaring and cheeky Adele" (The Irish Independent). Upcoming engagements this season include a concert tour in Japan in the Spring of 2025 with musicians from the Opera National de Paris.

In 2024 she performed title role of Handel's Atalanta at the Barokkfest Festival in Norway and joined French ensemble Miroirs Étendus for the revival and nationwide tour of Michael Gallens opera Elsewhere. She also began the process of workshopping a new opera Lucia Joyce by New-York based composer Patrick Zimmerli.

Sarah made her debut at the Bregenzer Festspiele in 2023 as Sophie in Werther directed by Jana Vetten with musical direction by Claire Levacher. She made her debut in the same role with Irish National Opera in May 2023 under the direction of Sophie Motley for a nationwide tour. In June of 2023, she was seen on stage once again with the Académie Opéra National de Paris in Looking for Bernstein directed by Victoria Sitja. In December, she performed in concert with conductor David Brophy and the RTE Concert Orchestra at the National Concert Hall, Dublin.

In the 2021/22 season, she collaborated with composer Donnacha Dennehy and writer Enda Walsh to sing the role of Karen in The First Child, the final opera in a trilogy produced by Irish National Opera and Landmark productions with a nationwide tour and performances at the Galway International Arts Festival. In July 2021 and October 2021, she was soprano soloist for Mozart's Mass in C Minor with the Orchestre de Pau Pays de Béarn under the direction of conductor Faycal Karoui in Pau, France. At the Abbey Theatre in Dublin, she was heard in Elsewhere a new opera by Michael Gallen with French ensemble Miroirs Etendus. In 2020, she appeared at the Wexford Festival Opera as Nannetta in Falstaff and performed in Irish National Opera's 20 Shots of Opera in the mini-opera Glaoch composed by Linda Buckley with a text by Doireann Ní Ghríofa and directed by Hugh O Conor.

At the Salzburg Festspiele in 2019, she was a member of the Young Singers Project. She performed the role of Angelika in Der Gesang der Zauberinsel a commissioned children's opera by Marius Felix Lange, performed in Masterclass with Helmut Deutsch and sang a final concert with the Mozarteumorchester Salzburg.

From 2017-2019, Sarah was an artist in residence at Opera National de Paris, where she participated in concerts of the Academy at the Amphitheatre Bastille and Palais Garnier and performed the role of Adele in 'Die Fledermaus' presented at the MC93 before a tour of several French cities. She made her debut in Paris as Leocadia in 'Reigen' by Phillippe Boesmans conducted by Jean Deroyer, and performed in concert with the Philharmonic Radio Orchestra, Bucharest for the Beirut Chants Festival 2017. After a performance at Palais Garnier in 2018, Sarah was awarded the Siemens Opera Award of €10,000.

Sarah graduated with a B.A in Music Performance and a Recital Artist Diploma from the Royal Irish Academy of Music where she studied with Dr. Veronica Dunne. Sarah has been a grateful recipient of bursaries from Siemens, The Arts Council of Ireland, Limerick City Arts Council and the Christopher Lynch Operatic Bursary.

Experience the joy, charm, and depth of Franz Schubert's music in a programme of some of his most beloved songs and instrumental chamber music. His Lieder from the tender and achingly beautiful An die Musik to the playful Heidenröslein, reveal the heart of a true Romantic and display his unsurpassed gift for melody.

The afternoon culminates in a performance of one of his most famous works The Trout Quintet. Composed when he was just 22 years old, it was commissioned by his friend Sylvester Paumgartner who requested both the slightly unconventional instrumentation and the inclusion of Schuberts earlier song 'Die Forelle' as a set of variations within the piece. This pillar of the chamber music repertoire overflows with wit, sparkle, and lyrical beauty.

Piatti Quartet String Quartet



Resident Quartet at Kings Place, London, the distinguished Piatti Quartet are widely renowned for their 'profound music making' (The Strad) and their 'lyrical warmth' (BBC Music Magazine). Since their prizewinning performances at the 2015 Wigmore Hall International String Quartet Competition, they have performed all over the world with numerous international broadcasts.

The Piattis are famed for their diverse programming and passionate interpretations across the spectrum of quartet writing with commissions and recordings of some of the most major and impressive works added to the quartet canon in recent years.

Since their inception they have always had projects in the recording studio with critically acclaimed releases through a multitude of classical music's top recording labels. Their wide ranging discography and repertoire is thanks to their enthusiasm and curiosity in collaborating with a broad range of artists including some of the most recognisable names in classical music. Recent accolades include five star BBC Magazine reviews for 2023 Mark-Anthony Turnage: Winter's Edge, 2024 Joseph Phibbs: Quartets and Ned Rorem: Choral Works with St. Martin's Voices, a Presto Music Award as one of the 'Top 10 Recordings of the Year 2023', and a nomination for 'Recording of the Year' with both Limelight and Gramophone for their 2022 collaborative disc with Nicky Spence and Julius Drake on the Hyperion label. This same album entitled 'On Wenlock Edge' was also singled out as one of the top 20 Ralph Vaughan Williams' recordings of all time with Gramophone

Magazine. Their follow up album, Fauré: La Bonne Chanson & Other Songs, has been shortlisted for the 2025 Gramophone Awards.

Contemporary music has been ever present in their repertoire and leaving a legacy to the quartet genre through commissions is one of the quartet's central tenets. Major commissions and dedications have stemmed from Mark-Anthony Turnage, Emily Howard, Charlotte Harding, and Joseph Phibbs whilst they have premiered a mesmerising number of new works over the years beginning with Anna Meredith back in 2009. The Concertgebouw Amsterdam, Flagey Radio Hall Brussels, Wigmore Hall London, and the Aldeburgh Festival are some of the high profile occasions where new music has been presented and recordings of Turnage, Phibbs, and Gavin Higgins' chamber music has also been extensively lauded by critics. After the UK premiere Julian Anderson's Ice Quartet, the composer himself described them as 'living treasures of chamber music.'

Historical research into quartet music that has been undiscovered or deserves to be better known has led to the premiere recording of Irish composer Ina Boyle's String Quartet in E Minor, Louise Farrenc's Piano Quintet in C minor, and performances of lesser known quartet gems by Ralph Vaughan Williams, E.J. Moeran, Rachmaninov, Ireland, Haas, Ulmann, and Durosoir.

The quartet's name is dedicated to Alfredo Piatti, a 19th Century virtuoso cellist who was a professor at the Royal Academy of Music (the alma mater of the founders of the quartet) and also a major exponent of chamber music and contemporary music of his time.

Recent highlights includes the quartet's ongoing residency at Kings Place alongside performances at Brighton Festival, Buxton Festival, Wigmore Hall, and Oxford International Song Festival. Upcoming events for the 25/26 season onwards involves a return to Amsterdam at the Muziekgebouw aan 't IJ, tours of Ireland and South America, and album releases on Signum Classics, Rubicon, and Chandos Records.

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Théo Ould

Accordion



The Stromae of the accordion" (Le Figaro) began his musical education at the Marseille Conservatoire at the age of 6: 'When I held the accordion between my hands for the first time, I was fascinated both by the sound it made and by the object itself, halfway between a computer keyboard and a spaceship: a machine to play with in every meaning of the word.'

The history of the accordion is still in the making, as its repertoire, technique, and even its construction continue to evolve. Following in the footsteps of his teachers at the Paris Conservatoire, Théo is fully engaged in the same artistic debate: how best to make sure that the instrument takes its rightful place in the classical repertoire.

And so as a soloist he freely plays the music he loves, Bach, Haydn, and Mozart, without feeling at all constrained by the burden of tradition - at the same time collaborating with composers of today such as Régis Campo, Tomás Gubitsch and Philippe Hersant, to expand the instrument's work catalogue and exploit all its capabilities. In 2023, he signed an artist contract with the Alpha Classics label and recorded his first solo album: Laterna Magica. He continues his collaboration with an upcoming album dedicated to the music of Astor Piazzolla which will be released in 2025. For the occasion, the artist creates his own arrangements for string quintet and accordion. From autumn 2024. Théo will also offer us a dive into the history of music. From Bach to the present day, you will be able to (re) discover a dozen pieces from the most beautiful pages of the repertoire through the sound of the accordion. Conceived as a real musical odvssev, two new tracks will be unveiled each month on streaming platforms. Passionate about opera as well as the UK rock scene, he has freely rewritten the conventions of the classical concert - not in any way to sacrifice the music, but rather to let it be heard in a different way, one in tune with our time.

Alison Langer

Soprano



British-Irish Soprano Alison Langer recently made her much anticipated Royal Ballet and Opera debut as Frasquita in Carmen. Other recent highlights include a return to the role of Violetta in La Traviata at Opera Holland Park and Mozart's C Minor Mass with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

Alison has a close relationship with Opera Holland Park and will return to the company for a role debut in 2026. Her role as Nedda in I Pagliacci for OHP was described as 'sparkly and vulnerable in equal measure'. Other roles for the company include Oscar in Un ballo in Maschera, Micaëla in Carmen and Gilda in Rigoletto. For Opera North she has performed Violetta in La Traviata and Micaëla in Carmen. Elsewhere she has performed Countess in Le Nozze di Figaro and Adina in L'Elisir d'amore (Waterperry Opera); Musetta in La bohème (Iford Arts) and Bridesmaid in Le Nozze di Figaro (Glyndebourne). She returned to Glyndebourne in Autumn 2025 to cover Mimi in their critically acclaimed production of La bohème.

She made her television debut on ITV's popular series Victoria, performing as the opera singer Jenny Lind and also performed Young Heidi in Follies for the National Theatre, which was broadcast nationwide in cinemas.

On the concert platform highlights include Mozart's C Minor Mass (Bergen) and Mozart's Requiem at St Martin in the Fields. Other concert venues include Buxton Opera House, Barbican Centre, Birmingham Symphony Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall, Royal Albert Hall, The House of Lords and The Ritz. She also performs a Recital Programme based on the life of Jenny Lind. Alison is grateful to be the recipient of a Richard Angas Memorial Award.

As an orchestral player she has guest led the Ulster Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra, RTE Concert Orchestra, BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra and Royal Scottish National Orchestra. Joanne has also performed frequently as a principal player with Orchestre Révolutionnaire et Romantique. The English Chamber Orchestra. The Philharmonia. The Royal Liverpool Philharmonic and the BBC Philharmonic. She was the leader of the Orchestra of Opera Northern Ireland for their critically acclaimed production of Tchaikovsky's Eugene Onegin and more recently Sondheim's Follies. From 2009-2019 she was a member of the John Wilson Orchestra and now plays with his Sinfonia of London Joanne has toured extensively performing on multiple occasions at the world's leading venues including The Royal Albert Hall, Carnegie Hall, Concertgebouw and Philharmonie Hall, Berlin. Away from the orchestra Joanne is in constant demand as a chamber musician, From 2015-2024 she

was the violinist with The Hard Rain Soloist Ensemble and has also performed with Crash Ensemble, Musici Ireland, London Sinfonietta and The Kings Consort. Since his early successes in major competitions including BBC Young Musician of the Year, the Royal Over-Seas League music competition and his selection as the UK's representative for the ECHO Rising Stars concert series, pianist David Quigley has enjoyed a varied international career as a recitalist, concerto soloist, collaborative pianist and educator.

He has performed as a soloist throughout Europe, USA and Asia in many of the world's greatest concert halls including the Philharmonie Köln, Concertgebouw Amsterdam, Symphony Hall Birmingham, Musikverein Vienna, Mozarteum Salzburg, Palais des Beaux-Arts Brussels, National Concert Hall Athens, Wigmore Hall London, Konserthaus Stockholm and Carnegie Hall New York.

As a concerto soloist he has appeared with many orchestras including the National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland, the Ulster Orchestra, Northern Sinfonia, RTÉ Concert Orchestra, Camerata Ireland, Southern Sinfonia and Cairo Symphony Orchestra.

David is a much sought after collaborative pianist and has performed with internationally renowned artists including oboist Nicholas Daniel, clarinetist Michael Collins, cellist Jonathan Aasgaard and sopranos Ailish Tynan and Mary McCabe.

David's discography includes Piano Music From Northern Ireland (Lontano), Rediscoveries: Old and New Music of Ireland with Joanne Quigley-McParland (Heritage), Piano music by Philip Hammond (Lontano), Piano Classics (El Greco) and Piano Nocturnes (Avie). His latest album The Fair Hills of Eire: Irish Airs and Dances (Heritage) was released in July 2022 to critical acclaim. He broadcasts regularly on both Irish and UK radio and television for the BBC, RTÉ, Classic FM and RTÉ Lyric FM.

Aside from performing, David is passionate about musical education. He is a member of the piano faculties at both Royal Birmingham Conservatoire and the University of Birmingham. David is frequently invited to give Masterclasses and to adjudicate piano competitions throughout Ireland and the UK. He has also served as a juror for the internationally renowned BBC Young Musician of the Year competition in both 2018 and 2020.

One of Europe's most versatile cellists, the Norwegian Jonathan Aasgaard is active as a soloist, chamber musician, studio musician, orchestral principal, teacher, and explorer of new music.

He is Principal Cello of both the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra and the Sinfonia of London, a regular guest principal of leading British and continental European orchestras, and, as a dedicated teacher, Professor of Cello at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama.

Chamber music performances have taken him across Europe, the Middle East, Japan, South Korea, and the USA: he has collaborated with artists such as the violinists Nigel Kennedy, Henning Kraggerud, and Julian Rachlin, violist Lawrence Power, cellists Yo-Yo Ma and Giovanni Sollima, pianists Simon Trpčeski, Boris Giltburg, and Joanna MacGregor, and clarinettist Martin Fröst in a range of prominent festivals and concert halls.

He has performed more than fifty works for cello and orchestra, his discography including recordings of the William Walton Cello Concerto with the Sinfonia of London, Richard Rodney-Bennett Cello Concerto with the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, Bloch's Schelomo with the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic, works for cello and orchestra by Carl Davis with the Philharmonia Orchestra, and, among a number of recital discs, Brahms's cello sonatas with Martin Roscoe, an 'Editors Choice' for chamber music in the magazine Gramophone. 2025 will see the release of Grieg's cello sonata and third violin sonata with pianist David Quigley.

A champion of new music, he has given the world première of Carl Davis's Ballade for cello and orchestra, the European première of Giovanni Sollima's Double Cello Concerto, the UK première of Weinberg's Cello Concerto, the US première of concertos by Franz Neruda and Emil Hartmann, and world premières of dozens of solo pieces, many written specially for him.

As a concerto soloist, he has worked with the National Symphony Orchestra of Ireland, as well as the Hibernian Orchestra, Dublin City Chamber Orchestra and the Royal Irish Academy Symphony Orchestra.

As a chamber musician, Dominic has played with many leading international musicians, including Nicola Benedetti, Philip Cassard, John O'Conor, the Vanburgh Quartet, the Con Tempo Quartet, the Danish Quartet, and Jorg Widmann, as well as numerous chamber concerts with members of the NSOI. Máire Flavin is an irish soprano working with leading companies across the UK and Europe. Operatic highlights include Violetta La Traviata Irish National Opera and Opera North; Mimì La Bohème Opera Theatre Company, Iford Arts and Cork International Concert Series; Countess The Marriage of Figaro Irish National Opera, Opera North and Salzburger Landestheatre; Elena La Donna del Lago Buxton Festival Opera; Mathilde Guillaume Tell Irish National Opera; Dido Dido and Aeneas Theâtre Champs Elysées as well as several roles for Opera North including title role Handel's Alcina, Hanna Glawari The Merry Widow. Fiordiali Cosí fan Tutte and the UK premiere as Anna Sørensen in Kevin Put's Pulitzer prize winning opera Silent Night. She has also created the roles of Hannah in Dennehy and Walsh's award winning *The* Second Violinist for Wide Open Opera and Bianca in Synott and Cucchi's La Cucina for Wexford Festival Opera.

On the concert platform Máire made her National Symphony Orchestra Ireland debut with Berlioz's Les Nuits d'Été and has been a regular guest since then, performing Mahler's Second Symphony, Mozart's Requiem, Handel's Messiah and several New Year's Day Galas. She has also been a soloist with other leading orchestras including RTE Concert Orchestra, London Philharmonic Orchestra, City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, Deutsche Philarmonie and Orchestra of Welsh National Opera.



Northern Irish tenor Aaron O'Hare has performed with leading opera companies across the UK and Ireland. Recent highlights include Spoletta in *Tosca* (Northern Ireland Opera), the Fourth Jew in *Salome* (Irish National Opera), Monsieur Triquet in *Eugene Onegin* (NI Opera), Alfred in *Die Fledermaus* (INO), and Adam in Jonathan Dove's *The Walk from the Garden* for Opera Collective Ireland.

As an Associate Artist with Welsh National Opera (2020–2022), Aaron sang the title role in Don Giovanni on tour, Stárek in *Jenůfa*, and the March Hare/White Knight in Will Todd's *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*. Other notable performances include Schaunard in *La bohème* (NI Opera), and *Elsewhere*, a new commission by Michael Gallen, produced in Ireland with support from the Centre Culturel Irlandais, Paris.

Aaron studied at the University of Ulster (BMus Hons) and the Royal Northern College of Music (MMus) under Matthew Best. He won Northern Ireland Opera's Festival of Voice competition and is a recipient of the BBC NI and Arts Council NI Young Musician's Platform Award. He was also a Young Artist at Opera Holland Park in 2018. In 2020, he appeared as Mike in John Adams' I Was Looking at the Ceiling and Then I Saw the Sky with the studio of Opéra de Lyon.

Sharon CartyMezzo-soprano



Irish mezzo-soprano Sharon Carty has firmly established a reputation as a respected interpreter of both early and contemporary works, and she also has a busy schedule in mainstream opera and concert repertoire. She is an alumna of the RIAM, Dublin, University of Music and Performing Arts, Vienna, and the Oper Frankfurt Opera Studio, and as of 2025 is the Artistic Director of Sligo Baroque Music Festival.

Her opera repertoire includes many of the important lyric and coloratura mezzo-soprano roles, working with conductors such as Nicholas McGegan, Joana Mallwitz, David Agler, Andrea Marcon, Kerri-Lynn Wilson, Henrik Nanasi, Julia Jones, and Jonathan Cohen. On the concert platform she has sung most of the major sacred concert works, including all the major works of Bach, as well as Handel's Messiah, Mozart's Mass in C minor, and numerous chamber-music works. She is also a dedicated song recitalist, most recently appearing in song recitals with pianists Finghin Collins and Jonathan Ware. A champion of new music, recent highlights include the world premieres of several new works Silvia Colasanti's opera, Proserpine at the Spoleto Festival, Deirdre Gribbin's "The stones of life" and Anne Marie O'Farrell's civil war cantata "Who'd ever think it would come to this". as well as Dorabella for Irish National Opera in their recent production of Cosi fan tutte.

2024 saw the release of two CDs of the music of C.V.Stanford, as well as recording Ina Boyle with the Piatti Quartet, while 2025 brings her role debuts as Orlofsky in Irish National Opera's Die Fledermaus, appearances at the Clandeboye Festival with pianist Barry Douglas, as well as a festival and role debut as Kate in Owen Wingrave at the Festivale della valle d'Itria, Martina Franca.

Mia Cooper studied at the Royal Northern College of Music with Yossi Zivoni and Chamber Music at the Paris Conservatoire with Michel Strauss. On graduating, Mia was principal first violin of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra for five years, and played with many of London's chamber orchestras and ensembles, including the Fibonacci Sequence, Barbican Trio, Brodsky Quartet, Chamber Orchestra of Europe and Academy of St Martin in the Fields. Mia was appointed leader of the RTÉ Concert Orchestra in 2006, and in the same year took up a position as Professor of Violin at the Royal Irish Academy of Music.

She has given masterclasses in the UK, Spain and Lithuania through Erasmus exchanges. Mia is in demand as a guest leader and as such has worked with the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, BBC National Orchestra of Wales, Royal Scottish National Orchestra, Philharmonia and Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

Her love of chamber music grew at an early age, and as a founding member of the Esposito quartet has given many radio broadcast concert tours of Ireland. Mia has also recorded a wide variety of chamber music, including the violin sonatas of Michele Esposito, and recordings for Naxos and Chandos as a guest of the Gould Piano Trio.



Joel, a proud Yorkshireman, began playing the viola aged 7. After studying at Chethams School of Music and the Royal Academy of Music, he became co-principal viola with the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra and later principal viola with the Swedish Radio Symphony Orchestra. He has also held the position of principal viola with the Mahler Chamber Orchestra since 2005. He has appeared as a guest principal with most of the UK orchestras and internationally with the Symphonie Orchester des Bayerischen Rundfunk, Bamberg Symphony, Oslo Philharmonic, Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra, Munich Philharmonic and the Amsterdam Sinfonietta.

As a chamber musician he has collaborated with many renowned artists and ensembles. Recent recordings include the Mozart Piano Quartets with Leif Ove Andsnes (Sony) and the Korngold Sextet (Chandos). Joel is a founding member of the Logos Chamber Group performing exclusively in Hong Kong and an ARAM recipient for his contributions to music in the UK.

Katherine Hunka

Violinist Katherine Hunka enjoys a diverse and colourful career as a violinist, chamber musician, composer and mentor. For twentysix years Katherine led and directed the Irish Chamber Orchestra. She directed tours in Germany, China and Singapore as well as in festivals closer to home including the West Cork Chamber Music Festival and Kilkenny arts festival. In 2002 she released a solo album with the ICO of Piazzolla's The Four Seasons of Buenos Aires and Schubert that received glowing reviews including five stars in the BBC music magazine. Katherine was Artistic Director of the Killaloe Music Festival for many years and is a regular guest as soloist and chamber musician at festivals throughout Ireland and the UK. Highlights of Katherine's solo career have been performing a Mozart Concerto with the City of London Sinfonia, premiering Benjamin Britten's concerto for violin and viola at the Aldeburgh festival and most recently premiering David Fennessy's concerto "Blood" with the Irish Chamber Orchestra in Berlin. Her group the Far Flung Trio presents wildly eclectic programmes that delight audiences. Their new album

"Umbrellas" was released in August on the Orchid Classics label. Katherine has composed several works of her own. "Pass the Hat" written for the Solas string quartet, of which she is a founder member, was toured in 2023. "The Bassist" for the bass and cellos of the Irish Chamber Orchestra was toured in 2024 and pieces for violin and loop pedal have been premiered at the Killaloe Festival and Kaleidoscope Night. This November the Solas quartet will premiere "Into the Clear Air" on their national tour. Mentoring young musicians is an important part of Katherine's musical life. She has been a guest prof at Indiana University, is currently lecturer at MTU Cork School of Music and is Artistic Director of ConCorda chamber music course. In June she directed the inaugural concert of the National Youth Chamber Orchestra of Ireland.

Martin Johnson

Violoncello



Martin studied Cello at the Royal College of Music, London under the direction of legendary Pablo Casals student Anna Shuttleworth and Andrew Shulman, Principal Cello – Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra.

In 2000, he joined the RTÉ National Symphony Orchestra and has been their Section Leader for more than two decades - broadcasting most of the orchestral cello solo repertoire to date. In 2006 Martin was invited to become a member of the World Philharmonic Orchestra and is also a regular Guest Principal with the major orchestras in Ireland and the UK. Martin made his Irish debut as a soloist with the RTÉ NSO in January 2008, performing Saint-Saëns Concerto No. 1 in A minor Op. 33 and has appeared as soloist with the Orchestra on more than twenty occasions since then - live solo broadcasts across Ireland and the UK have included concerti by Frank Corcoran (recorded for LyricFM CD154, 2017), Fauré (recorded for NAXOS Disc 8.574587,) Grainne Mulvey (recorded for Métier Mex 77129), Anne-Marie O'Farrell, Bloch, Elgar, Schumann, Tavener, Tchaikovsky, Joseph Haydn, Lalo, Saint-Saëns, Tippett, Delius, Corelli, Ibert, Beethoven's Triple Concerto and notably Richard Strauss's finest tone poem 'Don Quixote' Op. 35 for 'Cello and Orchestra with the RTÉ NSO and Maestro Pascal Rophé at Ireland's National Concert Hall, Dublin,

A brand new Cello Concerto by the extraordinarily talented young Northern Irish Composer Anselm McDonnell (LSO Composer in Residence) has recently been commissioned by the NSO/NCH for Martin and will be premiered in spring 2026. Next year will also see three performances of Brahms' much loved Double Concerto with Soloist Mia Cooper.

Martin is a Professor at the Royal Irish Academy of Music, a University College Dublin *Creative Fellow*, a Countess of Munster Scholar; an IT President's Prize Winner and has been supported by the Musical Instruments Loan Fund as well as Music Network's Music Capital Scheme in Ireland. He plays a fine cello by Thomas Kennedy of London c.1810 and an exquisite bow by legendary archetier Eugene Sartory made for the World Exhibition in Paris 1908.

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
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
